TWO YEARS OF THE BIDEN-HARRIS CLEAN ENERGY BOOM

334,565 NEW CLEAN ENERGY JOBS NOW AT RISK FROM TRUMP AND BIG OIL'S REPEAL CRUSADE

UPDATED: AUGUST 9TH, 2024

Since the Biden-Harris administration's landmark climate and clean energy investments became law in August 2022, companies have taken bold steps forward to build our clean energy future. New manufacturing in wind, solar, batteries, electric vehicles (EVs), and energy storage projects across the country means new, good-paying jobs. Since August 2022, companies have announced or moved forward with projects accounting for **more than 334,565 new clean energy jobs** for electricians, mechanics, construction workers, technicians, support staff, and many others.

As the largest U.S. investment in climate and clean energy in history, the Biden-Harris administration's Made in America clean energy boom is just getting started. Spanning from Georgia to Michigan to Arizona, these jobs are creating cleaner, cheaper energy choices for all of us – but former president Trump's \$1 billion "deal" with oil executives threatens to gut this progress. Trump has pledged to repeal the clean energy plan and crush these clean energy industries starting on "Day 1." House Republicans have already passed legislation to repeal the Biden-Harris clean energy plan, despite major clean energy manufacturing investments in many of their districts.

This brief analyzes public announcements from the private sector since the passage of the clean energy plan to demonstrate the breadth and scale of the growing clean energy economy being built across the country. It also provides a breakdown of the data by state, sector, and congressional district, as well as projects, jobs, and investments in rural and low-income communities across America and in districts represented by Republican members of the House of Representatives.

MORE THAN 334,565 NEW JOBS ACROSS THE COUNTRY

Companies have announced and advanced **646** new clean energy projects totaling **334,565** new jobs and over **\$372 billion** in investments across **47** states and Puerto Rico between August 16, 2022, and July 31, 2024.


Plans include **183** new battery manufacturing sites, **155** new or expanded electric vehicle manufacturing facilities, and **185** solar and wind manufacturing plants. The majority of projects are in five states —Michigan, Texas, Georgia, California, and South Carolina.

A bulk of the new clean energy projects are located in congressional districts represented by Republican members of the House of Representatives – totaling **190,727** new jobs and over **\$286 billion** in investment across **354** clean energy projects in **150** Republican-held districts.

In low-income communities, **290** new clean energy projects have been announced since the passage of the clean energy plan, bringing **\$114** billion in investment and **134,385** jobs to low-income communities across **38** states.

Across rural America, 117 new clean energy projects have been announced since the passage of the clean energy plan, bringing \$53 billion in investment and 52,128 jobs to rural communities across 33 states.

CLEAN ENERGY JOBS PER STATE UNDER THE CLEAN ENERGY PLAN



The jobs being created across the country are good-paying opportunities for electricians, mechanics, construction workers, technicians, support staff, and thousands of others. Clean energy jobs pay higher wages and provide good benefits; research from the Brookings Institution finds that landing a clean energy job can result in an eight to 19 percent income increase. 75% of the new jobs the clean energy plan will create don't require four-year degrees, meaning they're accessible to all Americans.

The transition to a clean energy economy is also benefiting union workers. The clean energy plan includes strong labor provisions and incentives to ensure these new clean energy jobs lead to careers that will truly sustain workers and their families. In November 2023, the United Auto Workers ratified a new agreement with Ford, Stellantis, and General Motors that guaranteed future EVs would be made in America with union labor. The new agreement also allows workers at new and planned EV battery manufacturing plants to join the UAW's master agreement, ensuring workers across the EV supply chain receive good pay and benefits. Unions outside of the auto industry are also benefiting from the clean energy plan. In


December 2023, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) signed a project labor agreement to build the SunZia transmission line across Arizona and New Mexico, an opportunity that IBEW President Kenneth Cooper said would "create good, middle-class jobs throughout the region." The project labor agreement follows an October 2023 national tri-trade solar agreement between the IBEW, the Laborers International Union of North America, and the International Union of Operating Engineers, which makes it easier for developers, contractors, and unions to bring more solar power online.

THE CLEAN ENERGY ECONOMIC BOOM IN THE STATES

States across the country have already benefited from the provisions of the national clean energy plan. Even climate skeptics have touted the benefits of the law and have celebrated clean energy project announcements in their districts because they now realize that the clean energy plan means big investments and new jobs in their communities. Since August

2022, the clean energy plan has significantly benefited local economies and will provide family-sustaining wages in ZIP codes from coast to coast.

METHODOLOGY

This report analyzes public announcements from the private sector since the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act (clean energy plan) to demonstrate the breadth and scale of the clean energy economic boom happening all across the country. It tracks public announcements from the private sector between August 16, 2022, and July 31, 2024. The full list of included projects can be found here. In this report, "low-income communities" are defined as counties or Census-designated places where the median household income is less than 200% of the federal poverty line. This analysis is based on publicly available income data ("Income in the past 12 months (in 2020 inflation-adjusted dollars)") downloaded on December 14, 2023, and the 2020 federal poverty threshold for a four-person household.

In this report, "rural communities" are defined as counties in which at least 50% of the population is located in a "rural" area, according to the 2020 Census. This analysis is based on publicly available data ("County-level 2020 Census Urban and Rural Information for the U.S., Puerto Rico, and Island

Areas sorted by state and county FIPS codes,") downloaded on September 11, 2023. The 2020 Census defines rural as all populations "not included in an urban area," and defines urban areas as those with at least 2,000 housing units or a population of at least 5,000.
