

Harris Battleground Poll: Winning on Climate and Energy

Online survey of 2,011 likely 2024 voters in the battleground states of AZ/GA/MI/NV/NC/PA/WI, including oversamples of 727 18-34 voters, 312 Latino voters, 429 Black voters, and 565 PA voters

Fielded August 2-4, 2024



Key Takeaways-Context

This is a competitive and winnable race. Harris and Trump are neck and neck in the trial heat, yet Harris leads on favorability and has significant potential to increase her vote share, particularly among voters of color and younger voters.

Climate and clean energy are strengths for Vice President Harris. Harris has strong initial advantage on these issues over Trump and climate change is especially important for consolidating soft supporters.

A contrast on energy costs is an advantage for Harris and shows that she is tackling voters' key concern: the cost of living. Her record on affordable energy and taking on Big Oil, versus Trump's alliance with oil CEOs is the strongest contrast for persuasion and mobilization audiences.

[PRICE GOUGING] Kamala Harris knows prices are too high, and many Americans are struggling with the cost of living. That's why she cast the tie-breaking vote for a plan to triple clean energy production and **save Americans \$38 billion on electricity bills**. She will take on Big Oil for price gouging. Trump sides with Big Oil billionaires over working people. His policies increase profits for Big Oil CEOs, leaving Americans vulnerable to more price hikes at the pump.

Emphasizing clean energy and going on offense against Big Oil is a winning strategy. Vice President Harris' record delivering policies to make energy more affordable and taking on Big Oil contrasts with Trump's alliance with oil and gas CEOs.

If Vice President Harris is attacked on fracking, messages centered on freedom and her support for commonsense safeguards effectively rebut these criticisms. These are the best-testing responses and significantly more convincing to voters than a response presenting Vice President Harris as having an all-of-the above energy strategy.

[FREEDOM] Kamala Harris is running for president to protect Americans' freedoms. Harris believes Americans should be free from the grip of Big Oil. She continues to invest in cheaper, cleaner energy manufacturing to give the American people a real choice. Trump just wants to block clean energy which will keep us dependent on Big Oil.

[COMMONSENSE SAFEGUARDS] Kamala Harris supports commonsense protections and safeguards to keep our air, water, and health safe. Fracking can cause water contamination and air pollution, which can cause cancer, birth defects, and other diseases, according to doctors and scientists. Harris believes in setting limits to reduce these risks while moving toward cleaner energy sources and creating a new generation of renewable energy jobs, which she has worked to do through the passage of historic legislation.



The race for president is tied in the full trial heat, and within one point in the forced two-way vote.





82% of Harris, 82% of Trump voters, and 22% of 3rd party voters say their minds are completely made up.



When forced to choose, nonpartisan voters and those who voted 3rd party or didn't vote in 2020 tend to lean toward Trump rather than Harris.




In both trial heats, Harris is strong with Black voters, with room to build her lead even more with younger voters and Latino voters.



Harris' overall favorability is better than Trump's.




Contrast remains crucial in the election. On candidate sentiment, we need to increase Harris's appeal while continuing to drive up Trump's negatives.

Fracking is not a top-of-mind concern for voters. If VP Harris faces criticism on fracking, emphasizing freedom and commonsense safeguards are effective counters.

Top-of-mind climate and energy associations with Harris are more positive than negative; only 3% mention fracking.

What do you remember hearing or seeing about Kamala Harris's record and positions on climate change, energy policies, and the environment?

We ran a split-sample experiment to test if explicitly stating that Harris won't ban fracking makes a difference.

Half of voters also saw a series of **DEFENSIVE** messages answering Republicans attacks and stating explicitly that Harris would not ban fracking. Half of voters also saw a series of **PROACTIVE/NON-DEFENSE** messages focusing on Harris's vision for America's energy future without directly citing a fracking ban.

We saw no significant difference in results from either series. Saying Harris will NOT ban fracking does not help or hurt our case.





Emphasizing Harris' focus on commonsense safeguards and protecting Americans' freedoms works well with gettable voters.


